Dyess B-1 launches first JASSM, JSOW

A Dyess B-1 made history with the launch of a Joint Air-to-Surface Standoff Missile and a Joint Standoff Weapon Tuesday at the White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

The AGM-158, (JASSM) and AGM-154, (JSOW) launches are the first time an operational B-1 has launched the standoff missile systems.

"It is a major improvement to the B-1's capabilities," said Capt. Mike Rooney, 337th Test and Evaluation Squadron project officer. "Before now, the B-1 would have to get close to some pretty heavily-defended targets. But these weapons give us true standoff capability -- to take on those heavily defended targets from a safer long-range distance."

The JASSM is an air-to-surface, self-propelled weapon with a single warhead that has an effective range of approximately 230 miles. The JASSM was designed as an independent cruise missile with the purpose of eliminating high-value fixed targets. It has the ability to "precision strike" hard tar-

gets, soft targets or targets of opportunity.

The JSOW is different from the JASSM because it is a gliding weapon system that drops cluster munitions at the target. The JSOW has an effective range of approximately 46 miles.

The JASSM and JSOW launches are part of the B-1 Joint Standoff Weapon/Joint Air-to-Surface Standoff Missile Integration program -- an extension of the B-1's Block E system upgrades. The B-1 JJI program is one part of the overall B-1 Conventional Upgrade Program.

Tuesday's JASSM and JSOW launches were a test of the B-1's new capabilities with the weapon system. It will be used to assess and expand the B-1's conventional weapons capabilities.

"(These weapons) are going to add a lot to our combat capability," said Capt. Janette Ho, 337th TES Instructor weapons system officer, with combat experience in Operations Allied Force, Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. "This is true standoff -- now we can strike a target from 150-plus miles away. Between the JASSM, JSOW, Joint Direct Attack Munition, MK-82s -

- that is a lot capability for a single jet on one mission. Whether we use it or not, we'll have that kind of capability."


The B-1 is also being evaluated to develop the procedures and tactics for how the weapons will be used in the field.

Once complete, the B-1 will have the largest JASSM capability in the Air Force with a maximum capacity of 24 missiles.

According to officials from the 337th TES, now that the final operational testing steps have been made, Dyess' B-1s should be seeing use of the new weapons systems as early as the wing's next deployment.

While the operational tests may have made history, the 337th TES test and evaluators agree that the test's most important aspect is bringing improved capabilities to American fighting forces in the field.

"This is a big leap in capability from what we currently doing," Captain Ho said. "While this will offer a lot of new challenges to our aircrews, maintenance, weapons loaders, this next deployment with these weapons will add a great deal of precision combat capability in only one jet."

E-8 promotion testing cycle window changes

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas -- All master sergeants competing for promotion to senior master sergeant will now take the U.S. Air Force Supervisory Examination test between Dec. 6 and 17. The testing cycle will no longer be in January.

Air Force officials said ongoing air and space expeditionary force deployments supporting the war on terror have dramatically reduced the number of eligible Airmen available to test during the current testing window.

Moving the testing cycle will allow more time for out-of-cycle testing before promotion release. The change will not affect the promotion announcement or the months during which promotions are made for the cycle. Testing conducted after Dec. 17 will be considered out of cycle.

Daniels comes down to Dyess

The Charlie Daniels Band will play a free concert at 7:30 p.m. Sunday at the Dyess parade grounds.

"I am looking forward to coming to Dyess," said Charlie Daniels. "It's really a lot of fun for us playing for America's men and women in uniform."

The concert is open to active duty, Reservists, National Guard, retirees, family members, Department of Defense civilians and their guests.

"The good lord has blessed me in ways I haven't even dreamed about," Daniels added. "This is my way of saying thanks to our military, who have chosen to serve something greater than themselves."

For residents of base housing, a bus route will run for the concert. The bus will begin running at 5 p.m. and make stops at the youth center, The Mesquite Grove Golf Course and the base parade grounds.

"I'm absolutely thrilled and love doing these concerts," Daniels said. "I go back to World War II days. I remember when it started. I remember when Pearl Harbor was bombed and when American patriotism was 100 percent. It was an awesome sight to see."

The 7th Services Squadron will host a variety of booths during the concert including multiple, food and drink booths as well as a children's play area with an air castle bounce and obstacle course. Medical and base fire services will also be available.


"I can't serve in the military myself. I was too young for the first couple of

wars and now I'm too old. So I'm doing what I can and trying to encourage those who can do more than I can, namely our troops."

The concert is free because Daniels donated his time for the performance, which is presented by the "Spirit of America Tour," a non-profit organization that brings volunteer, headline entertainers to U.S. domestic military bases. The tour plays free shows for members of the military as a way of thanking them for their service to the country.

Daniels is best known for his 1979 hit song, "The Devil Went Down to Georgia," as well as "Uneasy Rider," "The South's Gonna Do It," "Still in Saigon," and "Long Haired Country Boy."

Action Line

Comment: I just returned from the mandatory motorcycle safety briefing and I was told that now it is going to be mandatory each month. But people have car accidents all the time and we don't have a monthly briefing for that. I feel that this has become not some educational effort, but it is plain and simple harassment.

Response: With motorcycle riding season here and mandatory summer motorcycle meetings have begun, some questions and concerns have arisen.

Are the monthly motorcycle meetings mandatory? Yes, even if you only ride off-base during the summer months of June, July and August, you must attend the monthly meetings unless you are on temporary duty, on leave, or on a quarters medical profile. During the non-summer months, we'll hold quarterly meetings. If your commander believes you are mission essential, I'll review those requests for excused absences on a case by case basis. Motorcycle riders are forced to go to meetings because, simply put, you are in a high-risk group. My goal is to improve your survivability. Even though there are far fewer motor-

cyclists in the Air Force, cyclists account for a disproportionate amount of motor vehicle accidents each year. In 2003, Air Combat Command experienced 20 four-wheeled private motor vehicle fatalities and 9 motorcycle deaths. Also, short of fatalities are the injuries resulting in lost work days. In fiscal year 2003, four-wheeled non-fatal injuries totaled 107 with a total cost of \$529,661 in lost productivity. Motorcycle riders experienced 71 non-fatal injuries with a cost of \$568,282 in lost productivity. Less exposure and fewer accidents still resulted in higher costs. If you don't like the content of the meetings, get involved! The meetings are just getting started and are charged with the theme "riders mentoring riders." Each meeting is chaired by a different Group. Riders get to determine the content of their meetings. Please approach the meeting from the stand point of what can you do to help save the lives of your fellow riders. Bottom line: the mission comes first. If you get killed or hurt you compromise the missions. I want our teammates to enjoy riding -- I certainly do! But it's much more enjoyable when we do it safely. I've provided a venue to enable information cross-flow to decrease risk to riders, and we need you to do your part to make the meetings productive.

Take good, bad experiences and forge own path

Have you ever been mentored?

Many of you can answer with a definite "yes" and some may be able to name names.

Personally, I had to sit back for a moment and think back over my 20 years in service -- "Was I ever mentored?"

Maj. William Robinson, our 7th Communications Squadron commander, did an excellent job summarizing mentorship. "It involves an active role in helping a less experienced person grow and learn through shared knowledge, experience and insight."

He even made the point that informal mentoring happens regularly and often without either the mentor or mentee realizing it.

Over the years, I was exposed to many peers and senior leaders who showed me the right way, as well as the wrong way, to get things done, and I learned from both.

As you go through life, you will be presented many experiences.

Take advantage of those peers or supervisors who have "been there, done that" and let them mentor you or ask to be mentored.

The decisions in life or professionally are ultimately yours, so my suggestion is

to take the good experiences with the bad ones and then forge your own path.

My first experience to leadership taught me what not to do. This was part of the bad, or let's say an inappropriate, learning opportunity.

My workplace manager made a medical record transcription error. The error was found before the patient was given the wrong medication, labeling this as a "near-miss."

When the error was identified, my manager did not feel she should be held to the same standards as her staff and then created a "hostile" work environment when her integrity was in question.

Mental note to self: I will strive to never be like that. *Lesson learned:* Admit (at least to yourself) when you are wrong and show your staff or peers how to correctly "walk the walk" to correct the situation and be accountable.

Several other negative experiences included witnessing leadership by fear or leadership by non-existence. The effects of this poor leadership style were obvious and ranged from employee chaos to lack of creativity, initiatives or pride in the workplace.

Mental note to self: Be accessible and involved, but not to the point of micro-managing.

Never having experienced a formal mentorship relationship, a majority of my mentorship was informal and typically situational. Just like a sponge, I soaked in every bit of the scenario and the valuable lesson learned and stored it on the "back burner" for future reference.

Mentoring is a good thing and can come from unlikely sources.

Eighteen years ago, as a first lieutenant, I recall my first mentorship experience. I received a Christmas card from the Tactical Air Command Headquarters' chief nurse, one of my dad's co-workers before he passed away. It simply said, "Hi, Lori. Hope all is well. You should be completing your professional military education this year and getting involved in group-level projects. Merry Christmas! Josephine."

Can a formal feedback be a mentoring session? Of course it can. Has anyone ever asked you what goals you have for your military career? What would you like to do over the next one to five years? Have you started your PME... or, how are you doing with the PME?

Your direct supervisor should be asking you these important questions during your annual feedback session and talking to you about possible career paths. This is mentoring.

Take advantage of these feedback sessions -- be ready to discuss your self-identified areas of needed growth and how you

might convert them to strengths. If you have not been asked these questions, your task for today is to request a feedback session with your supervisor.

You do not have to be a supervisor to mentor. Your daily actions to unique situations or job stressors are being watched by peers. This builds a trust or confidence in a co-worker to comfortably approach you.

Even today as a squadron commander and lieutenant colonel, I welcome every "mentoring moment" and even request them. Learning happens at every rank and with every career progression.

But, mentoring is still a two-way street. You must take personal responsibility for your own career and then you are ready to help others. Let others learn from your mistakes or positive experiences.

Mentoring doesn't have to be just professional. Talk to folks about how career interfaces with single-income households, permanent change of station experiences, small children needs or spouses being constantly uprooted from their jobs.

Being able to identify with others who have experienced the same situation as you or just to learn about exciting job opportunities is all part of the mentoring process.

What you need to do is internalize all that you see. Remember even negative exposure, whether experienced or second hand, will mold you as a person. My best advice would be to take the good experiences with the bad and forge your own path.

Good leadership, followership must go hand in hand

When I was a senior in high school, I was co-captain of the Douglas High School Patriots football team in Box Elder, S.D. One night we were playing a game against our Black Hills Conference rivals, the Hot Springs Bison and, after a penalty, the referee came to me and explained the situation. Then he asked me if we wanted to accept or decline the penalty. It was the first time all year I had been put in such a position and I felt inadequately prepared to provide a response.

Though I had been a member of the team the previous year, I had never been involved in the decision-making process used by the team captains and the coach. No one had ever told me what factors to consider, what particular types of penalties meant what, or how to handle a situation that would put us in either a third down and five or a second down and 10 position. The fact is that when I was a junior, nobody on the line (including me) knew for sure that I or any of my classmates would be in a leadership position the following year and that some or all of us might benefit from understanding how leadership decisions were derived. Sadly, however, on that cold, windy and lonely Friday night, that was exactly the predicament I faced.

When the referee asked me the question, I looked



behind me for help from my other co-captain, but all I saw were the faces of junior teammates. I looked to the sideline and saw that the offensive and defensive coaches were sending different signals. The head coach, the only man on the field who had all the information needed to make the right decision, was busy talking to the other co-captain. It was clear to me that I would have to make a judgment call and then stand by it. Sadly, faced with a 50-50 shot at making the right decision, I chose wrong.

In the end, my decision was not a game-breaker. However, I realized that it could have been and I could not help but think there were several preventable breakdowns that occurred that night.

The breakdowns included lack of communication and understanding of the coach's intent and lack of leadership training for the team captains. Given that I was an 18-year-old high school student, there was little I could do about the former but I knew I was ultimately responsible for the latter and, as such, I was a critical link in the failure chain.

Despite the absence of a formal training program for team captains, there was much I could have done to prepare myself better. This was one of my earliest leadership lessons, and it taught me that good leadership is inextricable from good followership.

Leadership in our Air Force is no different. It is essential for commanders at all levels to continually communicate their intent and ensure their people are prepared to lead when the occasion arises. It is equally important for personnel on the line to fight for a better understanding of their commander's intent and take responsibility for their own leadership preparation and training.

It is far too easy to brush things off as someone else's responsibility or someone else's decision.

It is much more difficult to recognize the learning potential in a decision-making situation and fight for the

educational nuggets relating to it.

Given the ever-shrinking numbers of people in our Air Force and the increase in demands on peoples' time at all levels, this is exactly what each of us must do -- we must ensure that if we are in a leadership position, we empower people with the understanding of our goals. If we are in a follower position, we must fight to understand those goals and pursue feedback on how and why certain decisions are made.

If we find ourselves dealing with a little of both (leadership and followership), we must do our absolute best to understand and then communicate or embody the spirit and intent of our leadership's guidance. When people are in harm's way -- as they increasingly are in this day and age -- the difference between third and five and second and 10 may be very critical indeed. Our Air Force, and our country, depends on each of us and all of us to step up, lead and make the right decisions when faced with these difficult situations.

Spouse appreciation

Take time to say 'thank you for all you've done'

Like many of you, I've served several years in the military answering duty's call and almost haphazardly dragging my wife and kids along for the ride. As a uniformed member of the Air Force, I've often had folks stop me to say "Thanks for all you do," particularly since Sept. 11, 2001.

As members of the armed forces, we receive thanks and appreciation from the grateful nation we serve as we carry the war to our enemies.

However, I wonder how often we pass that gratitude on to our spouses and families -- the people who take care of us when we take care of the nation's business.

Take a moment to reflect on how much of that thanks and appreciation we owe to our spouses and the spouses of our brothers and sisters-in-arms.

I doubt the general population, or even many of our single members, truly appreciate the sacrifices made by our wives and husbands as we nonchalantly drag them with us through our military career.

What are some of those sacrifices? Let's start at home station.

Many spouses give up a good-paying job or even the possibility of a career.

Can your spouse find a job in Abilene? Perhaps, but when you transfer in two or three years, will that job transfer?

Or do they have to effectively start over again as the "new guy" at a new job in a new town?

It's difficult to advance in a career when you can't stay at a job for more than a few years at a time.

How about home-based businesses? Typical statistics for a small business show that it takes about three years to start truly showing a profit -- right about when it's time to move.

What about kids? Sure, we can share in the responsibility of raising our children, but ultimately who bears the primary responsibility? Whether you're flying, working on the flightline or helping customers, you can't always drop everything because the school calls and says your child is sick.

While the Air Force gives us time for our families, sometimes our responsibilities keep us from being able to be there.

So who does the responsibility fall on? Our spouses. Now it's time for a deployment. On top of worrying about our safety and welfare, our spouses are also left with all the worries at home.

Whatever responsibilities you normally took care of now falls upon them. Did you take care of the cars? Handle the finances? Deal with the home repairs? Now the spouse is left to take care of these responsibilities, and sometimes the only tool the spouse has is the power of attorney you took care of before you deployed.

What about emotional support? They've also just lost their best friend for several months.

Some locations have e-mail or webcams, but what about the remote locations where mail can take several weeks to get back and forth? They may have kids to console. While you're gone, who's going to play football, baseball, soccer, or attend cub scouts, dance recitals, and teacher meetings with them?

What about the wife who is waiting patiently at home due to deliver a baby? How many other jobs require their employees to be away from their families for months at a time? Or let's say you weren't one of the ones to go on this deployment. How has your work week been?

Maybe a little bit longer since there are fewer people to carry on the mission?

Have you gone from eight-hour to 12-hour shifts? Days to mids? If you're married, it doesn't just affect you.

When you come home exhausted from a long day at work and your spouse needs someone to talk to, or needs something taken care of, do you have the energy? The time? The patience? Let's get away from some of the sacrifices that our spouses make and take a look at some of the things they do to support us.

Have you received cookies during an operational readiness exercise -- probably cooked and delivered by the spouses' clubs?

How about meals delivered to your home after the birth of your child? Do corporations do that for you? No, but our spouses do.

If there are problems at home that you aren't there to help with, who can she turn to for support? You guessed it -- other spouses.

Do you remember the scene from "We Were Soldiers" where the postman shows up at Lt. Col. Moore's house? If you haven't seen the movie, it does a great job of presenting some of the sacrifices that our spouses make on a daily basis. We're no longer in the 1960s, and we're not losing people by the hundreds and thousands, but the sacrifices our spouses make aren't much different now than they were then.

If we were to have performance reports for our spouses, think about how their bullets would read.

I know one key phrase you should see on every one -- "Enabled Sgt. Snuffy to support and defend the Constitution, protect our way of life, and take the war to the enemy."

There are a lot of ways to show your

spouse that you appreciate them. Take the time to make a will. Make sure you have a power of attorney.

Flag has been powerful symbol, rallying point

WASHINGTON -- It was not all that long ago that everyone seemed to be flying an American flag.

In the days and weeks after the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington, American flags sprouted from everywhere.

At the World Trade Center site, New York firemen hoisted an American flag amid the rubble. At the Pentagon, workers paused and saluted as a huge garrison flag was draped next to the impact point.

Flags sprouted on minivans and motorcycles. People raised flags on new flagpoles on front lawns and atop apartment buildings. It seemed that every overpass on interstate highways had a flag, and this does not count the millions of decals, rub-ons and bumper stickers that featured the flag.

That was the latest manifestation of the flag of the United States of America as a symbol for all that the country stands for.

It seems in time of crisis, the flag is a rallying point.

On June 14, 1777, the

Continental Congress approved the U.S. flag and detailed the composition. Originally, it was literally a rallying point for the troops of the Continental Army. In battle, the unit flag was the center of mass, and from the area around the flag commanders gave orders and rallied troops.

The flag as a symbol of America grew out of the War of 1812. Francis Scott Key was so inspired by the sight of the American flag

flying over Fort McHenry on Sept. 12, 1814, that he wrote "The Star Spangled Banner."

"And the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air, gave proof through the night, that our flag was still there."

These words inspire Americans today, and when U.S. citizens see the flag, they are reminded that America is still "the land of the free, and the home of the brave."

The American flag has become more than just a red, white and blue design. It has become a symbol of what America stands for. America reunited under the flag following the Civil War. The American flag flew at the Marne in World War I and at Iwo Jima during World War II.

The American flag flew at "Porkchop Hill" in Korea and "Hamburger Hill" in Vietnam. It has flown over Grenada, Kuwait, Kabul and Baghdad. It covers the caskets of the fallen as they come home. And just recently, it adorned the coffin of former President Ronald Reagan, who in life created new respect for the stars and stripes.

The United States is more than just land fortunately located in North America. The United States is a republic, and Americans do not swear fealty to royalty or land or nobility. Rather, Americans swear to uphold the Constitution of the United States, and the American flag is a symbol of that oath.

Americans are reminded of that oath and those who have died for the freedom the American flag represents as they celebrated Flag Day June 14.

SECAF celebrates anniversary of Old Glory

ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE, Md. -- Secretary of the Air Force Dr. James G. Roche joined those gathered at the base flagpole Monday to celebrate the history of the nation's flag.

The U.S. Air Force Ceremonial Brass, Andrews base honor guard, veterans and guests joined in commemorating Flag Day.

"This is a special day, the anniversary of the adoption of a very powerful symbol," Secretary Roche said.

"This flag represents our nation and the values to which we aspire," the secretary said. "Imagine the feeling of pride our forefathers felt when they saw the flag at Yorktown [Va.]. You know the impact it had on Francis Scott Key at Fort McHenry [Md.]. Our national anthem is a tribute to this flag."

Montgomery GI Bill turns 60, still going strong

For 60 years, the GI Bill has been available for American servicemembers to help ease the transition from military service to civilian life.

Despite the fact that educational benefits are the most frequently cited reason for joining the military, nearly half of those eligible never use them.

This is surprising, considering the fact that using the GI bill has never been easier.

That is particularly true with the increasing array of adult non-traditional learning opportunities such as online, correspondence, and other distance learning programs.

Historically, America has compensated veterans for their services. Varying levels of benefits have been provided to veterans from colonial times through every major conflict.

Education benefits for veterans began with the Rehabilitation Act of 1919. This law gave disabled World War I veterans a monthly education allowance.

On June 22, 1944, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the "Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944," or as it is more commonly known, the "GI Bill."

This month will mark the 60th anniversary of that occasion.

Although controversial at the time, the GI Bill has since been

recognized as one of the most important acts of Congress.

During the past six decades, the law has provided billions of dollars in education and training for millions of veterans.

In 1976, the Post-Vietnam Era Veterans' Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) program was established. This was the first veteran's education requiring a contribution by the servicemember. It was available to people who entered on active duty between December 31, 1976, and July 1, 1985.

The Montgomery G. I. Bill (MGIB) Active Duty Educational Assistance Program is the current education program for individuals initially entering active duty after June 30, 1985.

The MGIB is also a contributory program. Basic pay is automatically reduced by \$100 per month for 12 months, unless the servicemember declines to participate at the time of enlistment.

To meet the basic eligibility requirements, active duty servicemembers must complete a minimum of two years of continuous active duty, and have a high school diploma or equivalent.

Veterans must be honorably discharged. Discharges "under honorable conditions" and "general" discharges don't qualify for the MGIB or VEAP.

Members must also have completed high school, or have an equivalency certificate, before they apply for benefits. In addition, veterans must have served at least two years on active duty.

Under the Montgomery GI Bill, full-time students, enrolled in a regionally or nationally accredited college or university, can get up to \$985 (non-taxable) a month to cover education costs.

That can add up to a total benefit of over \$35,000, and the benefits are increasing every year. This figure is based on the maximum benefit over a period of 36 months.

Many veterans don't realize that the GI Bill can be used for more than just getting a college degree.

The GI Bill also covers such things as vocation and technical training, licensing and certification, on-the-job training, apprenticeships and more. In fact, in recent years, the MGIB has improved by adding such programs as Active Duty Top-up, accelerated payments for high-tech courses, and the opportunity for active duty servicemembers to put in an additional contribution of up to \$600 to receive an additional \$150 a month in benefits. In addition, each year, the VA increases the basic "payment rate" that a full-time student is entitled to receive.

The Montgomery GI Bill also has a Selected Reserve Educational Assistance Program (MGIB-SR), which was designed to provide educational assistance to members of the Selected Reserve and National Guard. Like the MGIB, the MGIB-SR provides up to 36 months of education benefits for college, technical training and apprenticeship programs, and eligible members in most cases have 14 years to use their benefits.

Whether you are active duty, veteran, Guard, or Reserve, not taking advantage of the GI Bill in a timely manner can be costly, as the benefits are typically good for 10 years after the servicemembers' last discharge.

Since 1944, more than 20 million beneficiaries have participated in GI Bill education and training programs. The list includes an assortment of very well known individuals including singer Tony Bennett; actors James Whitmore, Bill Cosby, R. Lee Ermey, Clint Eastwood and Charles Bronson; comedian Paul Rodriguez; and actor and former Minnesota Governor Jesse Ventura, to name a few.





Maintenance muralist multiplies morale

Patrons deployed to one forward operating location dining facility now have the chance to take in some new artwork courtesy of a 40th Expeditionary Maintenance Squadron NCO.

His recently painted mural is based on the daily lives of those stationed at that location.

The mural, boasting a wide variety of pastel and earth-toned colors, portrays several desert combat uniform-clad Air Force members boarding one of the FOL's contractor-operated buses while images of a B-1 and KC-135 are reflected in the windshield and windows.

The mural demonstrates a variety of painting techniques to reflect each of its elements in painstaking detail, said the artist.

Staff Sgt. Chris Carter, 40th EMXS ammunition flight NCO who is deployed from Dyess, nearly three months ago, painted the work over a 12-day span.

The mural's theme was based on Sergeant Carter's personal observations during his deployment.

"I had a completely different idea of what I wanted to do when I first started," said Sergeant Carter. "But then one day, I was sitting on the bus and thought of a way I could paint Air Force members getting on the bus with some of the work that goes on around here reflected in the windows."

To get ideas for the win-

dow reflection theme, Sergeant Carter used photographs he had taken while deployed.

Armed with a maintenance stand on loan from aerospace ground equipment, paint donated by the local contractors and his drawings and photos, Sergeant Carter began his work.

"I basically worked a dozen 12-hour days every day with a two-day break in between," Sergeant Carter said. "This is not normally the way you are supposed to paint, but I needed to get done in a hurry because of the location of the mural."

The idea for the painting first came up when Chief Master Sgt. Mike Williams, 40th Expeditionary Maintenance Squadron superintendent, asked Sergeant Carter if he would mind coming up with an idea for a dining facility mural and bringing it to life.

"The chief was familiar with my work from some of the projects I had worked on back at Dyess and thought I would do a pretty good job," Sergeant Carter said. "I had designed a maintenance effectiveness

coin before I left that my squadron leadership was pretty happy with."

The 24-year old artist has had an interest in art since he was 4. An accomplished artist in high school, he dreamed of someday attending school to study art.

However, Sergeant Carter had a significant challenge when he was asked to undertake the project -- he had never painted a mural before.

"Actually, I had only painted once before," Sergeant Carter said. "Most of my work is sketches, charcoal sketches, computer graphics and things like that."

Undaunted by the task, Sergeant Carter first started out drawing his idea by hand on a piece of paper.

"I just blew up the proportions and started drawing it one square at a time," Sergeant Carter said.

Once the drawing was completed, it was time to paint, but then Sergeant Carter ran into another obstacle.

"When I was first planning out this mural, I had asked for acrylic paint -- like the type you could buy

back in the States," he said. "What I got was 50-year old house paint. It took a little bit more time for me to figure out what worked and what didn't before I finally got it right."

Sergeant Carter also credits the feedback he received from many dining facility patrons who helped him put out his work.

"Every day somebody would let me know what

they thought about the mural and how it was coming," Sergeant Carter said. "At one point, I was asked about one of the details on the bus that was apparently hard to see for others.

Once I took a step back and looked at it from their perspective, I realized they were right and was able to make the change."

While dining facility

visitors sit back and marvel at the painstaking detail of Sergeant Carter's latest work, he still fights urges to get back up and work at it some more.

"When I paint, I have to subscribe to a theory of mine that if you tinker with something too much, you will probably ruin it," he said. "I'm just happy that people like what I did so much."






