



## 405th AEW earns AFOUA

Dyess people who were members of the 405th Air Expeditionary Wing from Dec. 28, 2001, to May 31, 2002, are authorized to wear the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with the Valor device.

According to the Air Force Personnel Center, the Secretary of the Air Force traditionally presents the award to units which distinguished themselves by exceptionally meritorious service or outstanding achievement that clearly sets the unit above and apart from similar units.

A bronze "V" device for valor is worn on the ribbon to denote award for combat or direct combat support actions.

"It means a lot to me," said Tech. Sgt. Kriski Williams, 7th Bomb Wing NCO-in charge of the command section who was deployed to the 405th AEW. "This award will remind me what we were fighting for and the great people I worked for."

However, before eligible Dyess people can wear the medal, they must make sure their records are updated.

According to Capt. Carey

Eichhorst, 7th Mission Support Squadron's Military Personnel Flight commander, items such as previous decorations, travel vouchers or a copy of orders is all that is needed to update records.

"Anything that shows us you were there during the time frame the award was presented will work," Eichhorst said.

## Airman named Air Force's best feature writer

A *Peacemaker* story about a Dyess single NCO caring for his deployed buddy's kids earned a Dyess airman an Air Force award recently.

Senior Airman Lindsey Maurice, Dyess Public Affairs, was named the Air Force's best feature writer for her story titled "Dyess NCO fills in as 'Mr. Mom' during OEF," at the service's media contest last month.

Her feature about Staff Sgt. Brian Nunley, assigned to the then-7th Supply Squadron, caring for a deployed friend's young children appeared in the Feb. 22, 2002, *Peacemaker* edition and in Air Force Print News a few days later.

Capt. David Honchul, Dyess Public Affairs chief, said Maurice's hard work paid off with this "huge" award. "Once we learned about the 'Mr. Mom' story, we knew it had potential to be a major story, Honchul said. "I asked her specifically to write it because I felt she had the skills to put the right touch on the story and tell it to the Dyess and Air Force community. The outpouring of notes from across the Air Force after it ran on Air Force Link confirmed to me what I already knew -- she hit a home run. I couldn't be more proud of her or the rest of the *Peacemaker* staff."

Maurice penned nearly 100 stories for the *Peacemaker* last year -- eight of which also appeared in command news services -- but Maurice said her "Mr. Mom" story had special meaning for her.

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# Why do we fight?

"As you know, my service to our country was with the 3rd Infantry at Arlington in the late 60s. Back then, late at night, I would see the faces of those we had put to rest and know first hand the dangers that all of our troops must be experiencing today.

"At night these days, I see the faces of the men in uniform who came to our rescue in the buildings on 9-11. Arlington did not prepare me for the river of tears that were shed here in New York over the last 16 months. The justice that I feel that all of you are delivering today warms my troubled soul. I believe all those who were lost that day would send you their gratitude as well.

"I think of how proud I was to give a few years to my country's service. I now feel the same kind of pride when I reflect upon all the people we have in uniform today in harm's way. It gives me a great deal of comfort to know there are dedicated professionals like you and your team that this country can call upon, in our time of need.

"I lost many friends on 9-11. I truly believe that what you are doing for us today is making us all a lot safer. I also believe that you are making those who don't like us more reflective of the consequence of their actions.

"God bless you. God bless all in your command. God Bless America.

"Survivor WTC 9-11"

Let us never forget why we fight. I salute you and am proud to be in this fight with you, and leave you with this quote, one by Abraham Lincoln:

"Our reliance is in the love of liberty. Our defense is in the preservation of the spirit which prizes liberty as the heritage of all men, in all lands, everywhere."

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# Two 7th SVS troops named best in ACC

Two 7th Services Squadron troops took home top honors in the 2002 Air Combat Command Services awards competition recently.

Staff Sgt. Sachiko Jones, 7th SVS NCO in-charge of plans and programs, won ACC Services NCO of the Year, and Charles Mosley, auto skills center tools and parts attendant, was named ACC Services Civilian Technician of the Year.

"I was speechless when I heard the news," Mosley said. "I was ecstatic just to win for the quarter at base-level, so when I found out I won at ACC, I was just amazed. I consider it a great honor."

Mosley's supervisor, however, was sure he'd win all along.

"None of us working for the government are here to become wealthy," said Shawn Gailey, auto skills center manager. "What drives Charles, and I believe most of the civilian workforce, is making a difference in the lives of those that serve in the military. And he constantly gives more than is asked of him, focusing on the customers' desires. He is

very deserving of this award."

Mosley has had numerous achievements during the past year. He helped facilitate the family support center's Car Care Because We Care program, which offers a 27-point inspection on one vehicle for spouses of deployed personnel.

"(This program helps) reduce the stress of separation for members deployed as well as the families back home," Gailey said.

Mosley also works with the FSC to handle vehicle

repair work for young airmen who are struggling financially. Together, they ensure these airmen receive cost-effective repair to their vehicles, making the vehicles reliable, Gailey said.

Keeping his focus geared toward customer satisfaction, Mosley also conducted a cost comparison on automotive care prices, comparing the auto skills center's to off-base competitors. He then adjusted the auto skills center's prices to match or beat competitor's prices. This resulted in a "tremen-

dous savings to Dyess airmen," Gailey said.

Mosley also implemented a plan for the auto skills center to maintain a fleet of 33 non-appropriated fund vehicles for 7th SVS, Gailey said. By completing the maintenance of the vehicles themselves instead of through a contractor, the center is saving the squadron 23 percent.

The ACC Services NCO of the Year has also been exceptionally busy this year, according to her supervisor. Jones has taken on numerous duties including working at the Dyess Inn, with base mortuary affairs, as the 7th SVS unit deployment manager, 7th SVS security manager and as a resource augmentee monitor. Jones also deployed twice in 2002 in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, first in March and again in December. She is currently deployed.

"Staff Sgt. Jones is one of the best junior NCOs in our squadron," said Senior Master Sgt. Stephen Bush, 7th SVS combat support flight superintendent. "She takes on every task with enthusiasm and always produces high-quality work. Her great track record speaks for itself."

For instance, her "exceptional leadership" and operational oversight were instrumental to the quarterly lodging customer satisfaction rating reaching 98 percent, Bush said. This exceeds the ACC Services standard of 70 percent, he added.

As the 7th SVS UDM, she organized airport greeting and equipment return for 22 7th SVS people returning home from deployments. Along with their return, Jones also volunteered to pick up their mobility and chemical warfare equipment bags when they arrived and return them to supply. This was a huge morale boost for the returnees, Bush said.

Jones was also selected as the 2002 7th Mission Support Group NCO of the Year.

While deployed, Jones was also hard at work.

During Jones' first 2002 OEF deployment, she worked diligently with contracting to establish a much-needed linen and laundry contract to provide support for cleaning uniforms, linens and mattresses. Within one week, she had full linen and laundry services available for the camp population.

"She is a true warrior," Bush said.

## 7th MDG hosts first West Texas Homeland Symposium

While most of the public's attention has been concentrated on military operations in Iraq, the 7th Medical Group brought the Abilene health community together April 11 to focus on their roles in preparing for and responding to terrorist attacks on the homefront.

The first West Texas Homeland Defense Symposium brought together about 270 military and civilian area health and medical professionals, as well as civic leaders, to discuss the risks of another terrorist attack, what role medical professionals could expect to play in recovering from such an attack, and how to strengthen the relationship between the base and local medical communities, officials said.

"The original intent (for the symposium) was to have a venue for the local medical providers," said Maj. (Dr.) Bret Burton, one of the event organizers. "As we began discussions with the City of Abilene and the Abilene-Taylor County Health Department, the 'ball of yarn' got bigger. (It was) requested that we extend our invitation to first responders."

Burton stated the idea for the symposium occurred last fall during a meeting of the Association of Military Surgeons. At that conference, 7th MDG commander Col. Schuyler Geller and retired Lt. Gen. (Dr.) Paul Carlton discussed the possibilities of the general coming to Abilene to discuss homeland defense issues. Carlton had just retired from the Air Force as the service's surgeon general, and was on his way to Texas A&M University to become the school's home-

land defense coordinator.

"(Carlton) agreed to come and speak if we decided to (conduct the event)," Burton said. "Colonel Geller jumped at the opportunity and set the ball in motion."

According to another of the conference speakers, forums like this are necessary to remind people that "the threat of terrorism is real."

"The farther away we get from 9-11, the more complacent people can become about the threat," said Lt. Col. Salvadore Flores, chief of the Development Center for Operational Medicine at Brooks City-Base in San Antonio. "It must be a concern. (There is a) need for both civilian and military health personnel to get together, form a plan and use their resources wisely."

# Linear Air Park prepares for Star of Abilene

The Dyess Linear Air Park will soon welcome a new "Star" attraction to the park.

The construction began April 11 to prepare the park for the upcoming arrival of The Star of Abilene -- the Air Force's first production model B-1B bomber and the first B-1B to serve at Dyess.

"It will be a tremendous addition to the air park," said Richard "Doc" Warner, Dyess visitor center manager and Linear Air Park curator. "The Star of Abilene is an important piece of Dyess history, and as such, it is only befitting that it remain here for Dyess and Abilene citizens to appreciate and admire for years to come."

Almost immediately after its final flight more than a month ago, The Star of Abilene was being prepared to go into the air park.

"There is a lot more involved (with getting a plane ready for an air park display) than people think," said Tech Sgt. Brett Foreman, 7th Aircraft

Maintenance Squadron. Foreman was the head crewchief for The Star of Abilene during her last year of service and has been working on the air park restoration team from day one. "It is a real learning experience."

"Almost everyone on base will be (helping) make this happen," added Senior Airman Randall Reynolds, 7th AMXS crewchief. "It is a huge job and everyone will have to do their part from the mechanics at the 28th Bomb Squadron to (Civil Engineer Squadron) and even the folks at finance."

According to Foreman and Reynolds, thousands of parts, components and systems must be pulled off the bomber as only the first step in process. Before The Star of Abilene can be placed in its new home at the front gate, the F-111 and B-66 aircraft that currently reside there had to be relocated so the pedestal areas could be prepared.

The B-66 aircraft will be taken to the spot currently occupied by the air park's C-130, while the F-111 will be placed in a new location east of the gate along the side-

walk. The air park's C-130 will move to the south side of the front gate opposite The Star of Abilene.

After these aircraft are rearranged and the area is prepared, The Star of Abilene will then be towed from the three-bay hangar to its new home.

Due to its large size, special arrangements have been made to tow the bomber off the flightline and along the north side of the base. After completing this leg of the journey, The Star of Abilene will then make a right turn behind the 7th Medical Group and be pulled into place. Once in place, Dyess

will have the first production B-1B bomber and the first production C-130A model aircraft in the Air Force on display together.


According to Foreman, the bomber should be moved into place in early June. The dedication ceremony is scheduled to coincide with

the 18th anniversary of The Star of Abilene first arriving at Dyess in June 1985.

The Star of Abilene was the flagship of the Dyess fleet. Before its retirement, the aircraft, tail number 83-0065, flew more than 900 sorties and nearly 3,750 hours.

"This is the first story I've written that I really got into," she said. "When I sat down to talk to him and hear all the details of what he was going through, I could tell that this was a big culture shock for him -- going from being a single NCO with no kids to suddenly taking care of two young children."

Maurice normally performs newspaper interviews either in her office or at her subject's work section, but felt Nunley's story deserved special treatment. To better understand her assignment, Maurice accompanied the NCO for a day to observe his

interaction with the kids.

"This was the first time I have really went into the environment of the story," she said. "We went to the school to pick up the kids, ate dinner with them and helped them do their homework. It was really interesting to see how the kids interacted and accepted him."

The Air Force award isn't Maurice's first taste of newspaper writing honors. She placed third in last year's Air Combat Command media contest for series writing. This year, she and Senior Airman Matthew Rosine, *Peacemaker* editor, each notched first-place honors in the ACC Media contest -- Maurice for her feature, Rosine as best new writer. Although she said she was happy to win at ACC level, she was "blown away" upon hear-

ing of her Air Force honors.

"I was really excited when I heard I won," she said. "It was a real shocker."

Rosine disagreed. "I'm not surprised in the least," he said. "Lindsey is just a professional at what she does -- it is that simple."

First Lt. Saje Park, public affairs deputy chief, concurred with the editor's assessment. "It's great to see Lindsey's continuous hard work, dedication and professionalism pay off," she said. "She has a talent for excellence in everything she undertakes -- we're lucky to have her."

Maurice's story now competes with winners from the Navy, Army, Marine Corps and Coast Guard later this month for the Department of Defense's Thomas Jefferson award.





As part of those joint efforts, Dyess officials announced that Air Combat Command has given the base money to purchase an In-Place Decontamination Unit, a specialized tent that can be set up anywhere in the Big Country region to clean victims of chemical and biological events.

"It will be an extremely effective, portable way we can help the population in the event of any number of disasters," Geller said.

The medical group will maintain the unit at the base, Geller said. When needed, it can

be transported by truck to where it's needed, set up in 15 minutes, and be fully operational in 30 minutes. The unit can decontaminate 100 people at a rate of about 30 people per hour.

The base was given \$77,000 for the unit which includes materials and supplies for the unit, as well as training costs for personnel to become familiar with its operation.

With the success of this first symposium, including a greater attendance than anyone expected, officials are already setting their sights on making this an annual event, Burton said. The group plans to seek to expand the forum to include breakout sessions for the attendees.



## TFA processing:

The TFA will be located in Building 7008 at 426 Third Street. Privately-owned vehicles will be parked in the large parking lot west of the TFA/CCA. No privately owned vehicles are deployed to the play area.

All exercise participants must bring the following items for processing through the TFA:

- Reflective belt
- Gas mask
- C-1 bag with chemical ground crew ensemble

- Simulated M8 paper booklet

Members will need the things listed above during this exercise, however the TFA will only check for military ID cards and dog tags. Unit deployment managers should check to ensure you have the rest of the items before the exercise starts to help streamline the process. All exercise players must contact their UDM if they do not have a **gas mask and complete chemical ground crew ensemble**.

Deployed UTC and non-UTC support personnel must process through the TFA prior to entering the play area. Manning rosters will be used to ensure players process into the play area. Personnel reporting to the exercise will enter at the west side of the building. After TFA processing, personnel will exit the building from the north side and board a shuttle bus to their play area.

## CCA processing:

The CCA will also be located in Building 7008 at 426 3rd Street. All deployed UTC and non-UTC support personnel must process through the CCA prior to departing the play area. Manning rosters will be used to ensure players process out of the play area.

At the end of their shift, personnel will board a shuttle bus from their play area to the CCA. Personnel will enter at the north side of the building. After CCA processing, personnel will exit the building from the west side and leave the parking lot in their privately owned vehicles.

## Field food services:

Field food service will be provided at the cantonment area via the mobile kitchen:

**Breakfast** -- Meals ready to eat will be handed out from 6:30-7:30 a.m. The cost is \$3.25.
