

# Airlifters earn 'outstanding' rating for LSET

The 317th Airlift Group's maintenance team was deemed "outstanding" after a five-day inspection by the Air Mobility Command Logistics Standardization and Evaluation team June 23-27.

After reviewing more than 1,000 areas within the group for compliance with Air Force aircraft maintenance management instructions, the team was only able to find four non-compliant items -- making the 317th AG's compliance rate the best ever in AMC.

"I am extremely proud of each member of the 317th AG for all they do," said Col. Richard Johnston, 317th AG commander. "With nearly one half of our troops deployed, and those here having to not only do their job but the jobs of those away and still making the top rating really says a lot about our people."

The LSET named 10 individuals within the group as "outstanding performers" as well as seven items as "best practices."

During the inspection, the 19-person team visited work centers within the group and conducted one-on-one interviews with various supervisors and technicians about their job and how the 317th AG conducts its maintenance.

"There was little or no interaction between the team and senior supervision, as it's intended to see how well we do our jobs at the technician/supervisor level," said Lt. Col. Mark McLeod, 317th AG deputy maintenance commander.

The team's main job is to identify areas where units are non-compliant and where units are compliant "with minors" -- complying with the spirit and intent of the Air Force Instruction but has areas where it can improve, McLeod said.

# Dyess welcomes back new vice commander

Dyess welcomed back a familiar face who recently became the new 7th Bomb Wing vice commander.

Col. Gary Harencak replaced former 7th BW vice commander, Col. Tom Bell, Monday.

"I am looking forward to helping Dyess do what it does so well -- accomplish

the mission and take care of our people," Harencak said. "Dyess is renowned for its ability to do both and for its tremendous relationship with the community. I just want to do my small part to assist the Dyess team in doing what they do best."

The 20-year Air Force veteran earned a bachelor of science degree from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1983. After being commis-

sioned, Harencak attended undergraduate pilot training at Reese Air Force Base, Texas, followed by B-52 combat crew training at Castle Air Force Base, Calif.

Harencak then served five years with the 97th Bomb Wing before arriving at Dyess in 1989. Then-Captain Harencak earned his masters of science degree from Abilene Christian University while serving under the 96th

Bomb Wing.

Harencak returned to Dyess four years later in 1997 after attending the Air Command and Staff College and serving at MacDill Air Force Base, Fla., for three years. During his second tour at Dyess, Harencak served as an instructor pilot with the 9th Bomb Squadron and then as the 28th BS commander.

# New fitness center set to open this fall

After a year and a half of work, Dyess' new state-of-the-art fitness center is on track to open this fall.

"We have a tentative date to (move) to the new building in November," said Constance Delamater, 7th Services Squadron deputy commander. "We will have to remove equipment from the old facility prior to the move and will have limited service -- leaving only the health club available for use. However, it will only be for a short period of time."

"The new center will be a great addition to Dyess with additional space and room for more activities compared to the facility we currently have," said Tech. Sgt. Derrick Ellington, 7th SVS assistant fitness center manager. "(People) will enjoy

the very best equipment on the market today along with a facility that everyone will be proud to visit and use."

The new complex will house a gymnasium, four racquetball courts, a group exercise area, cardiovascular and weight training areas, a six-lane swimming pool, an

indoor track and the health and wellness center all under one roof, said Murray Bouquet, the fitness center project manager.

The new 78,000-square-foot fitness center will be located adjacent to the existing center,

"Once the new fitness

center is built, the old one will be torn down to accommodate more parking spaces," Bouquet said.

"Having the HAWC and fitness center under one roof will be beneficial to Dyess people," Ellington said. "Now our customers won't have to travel to different buildings for fitness and health issues."

The 146-meter, 4-foot wide indoor-elevated running track with banked corners is one of the main highlights of the new fitness center, Bouquet said. "The track will have a resilient running surface and will be suspended around the perimeter of the gym with two stairways and an elevator to access the track," he said.

The indoor swimming pool will be 5 feet deep and 45-by-75 feet long, built for lap swimming and water aerobics, Bouquet said.

Shower and locker rooms will be available complete with saunas.

Bouquet said the HAWC will contain a microfit room with stationary bikes and various testing devices; a physical therapy office; massage, cycle ergometry, body fat measuring and stress management rooms and a resource library.

The HAWC will also feature a residential-style kitchen area for food preparation classes, Bouquet said.

The cardiovascular training room will have treadmills, stationary bikes, stair climbers and a treadwall.

The weight training area will house both weight machines and free weights with a short divider wall separating the two areas.

The new fitness center will give the base a fresh new look and something to be genuinely proud of, Ellington said.

## 900 AF members face involuntary retraining

Hundreds of Dyess NCOs eligible to change jobs when Phase II kicks off Monday

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas -- More than 900 airmen may be involuntarily moved to shortage career skills starting Monday

According to Air Force Personnel Center officials, although 450 airmen volunteered to change career fields during the initial phase of this year's noncommissioned officer retraining program, it was not enough.

The retraining program is designed to help balance the enlisted force by moving NCOs in specialties with surpluses to those with shortages. In April, the Air Force said it needed about 1,400 airmen to change careers.

At Dyess, more than 300 individuals were initially listed as potential retrainees. According to the military personnel flight's employment and retraining office, more than 30 Dyess people have already volunteered during the initial phase of

the retraining program.

"Some people were fairly excited because they had been wanting to retrain anyway," said Staff Sgt. Chong Arnold, NCO-in-charge of employment and retraining. "This was a good opportunity for them."

Under the involuntary Phase II section of the program, not everyone is guaranteed his or her first choice. Major commands continue to accept volunteer applications. Personnel officials are also encouraging eligible NCOs to also consider special-duty assignments such as recruiting, military training instructors, first sergeant duty or professional military education instructor.

"There's still time for those who have been identified for possible retraining to volunteer," said Chief Master Sgt. Alvin Diaz, AFPC chief of the skills management branch. "It's up to each airman, but if it were me, I'd think having (some) control

over my career would be a priority and help reduce the stress of not knowing whether or not I will get that notification asking me to make a selection -- I'd volunteer."

Factors such as retention rates and new promotions may have an effect on how many airmen will finally be retrained, but Dyess employment and retraining personnel say no one should take anything for granted.

"Even if someone was recently promoted, there is no guarantee they will be effected -- if they are on the list, chances are they will stay on the list," Arnold said.

Vulnerability listings by pay grade and Air Force specialty code will be updated online weekly on the Air Force Personnel Center's Web site at <https://www.afpc.randolph.af.mil/enlskills/Retraining/retraining.htm>. As of June 25, three career fields were removed from the

retraining list. They are:

- 3EOX1, electrical systems**
- 4YOX1, dental assistant**
- 4YOX2, dental laboratory**

Beginning next week, officials will start notifying airmen selected as most vulnerable to retrain. They will ask the airmen to submit their choices of shortage career fields they would most like to retrain into as part of the program's Phase II. The second phase runs through Aug. 15.

"We will do what we can to help," Arnold said. "We will supply people with all the information we have. Each case is different, so if we don't (readily) have the answers they need, we will find out."

# 9 Dyess UCMJ violators administered Articles 15

*Editor's note -- Names of Article 15 violators are not released.*

Nine Dyess members were recently administered Articles 15 for Uniform Code of Military Justice violations.

- An airman first class was demoted to the rank of airman for failing to obey an order from an NCO. The airman violated **UCMJ Article 92 -- Failure to obey an order or regulation.**

- An airman first class was demoted to the rank of airman for failing to obey a lawful order from an officer. The airman violated **UCMJ Article 92 -- Failure to obey an order or regulation.**

- An airman was ordered to forfeit \$300 pay, and received 14 days extra duty and a reprimand for wrongfully drawing a firearm, possessing pornographic images and being derelict in the performance of duties. The airman violated **UCMJ Article 92 -- Failure to obey an order or regulation.**

- A senior airman received a suspended reduction in rank to airman first class, suspended forfeiture of \$150 pay per month for two months, 14 days extra duty and a reprimand for having a loaded magazine in a firearm and drawing the firearm. The airman violated **UCMJ Article 92 -- Failure to obey an order or regulation.**

- An airman was demoted to the rank of airman basic and received 45 days extra duty and a reprimand for making a false statement to a an NCO and failing to obey an order. The airman violated **UCMJ Articles 92 -- Failure to obey order or regulation, and 107 -- False official statements.**

- A senior airman received a suspended reduction in rank to airman first class, forfeiture of \$300 pay per month for two months (\$150 pay per month suspended) for unlawfully entering a place of

dwelling and disobeying an order. The airman violated **UCMJ Articles 92 -- Failure to obey order or regulation, and 130 -- Housebreaking.**

- An airman first class received a suspended reduction in rank to airman, 30 days restriction and 30 days extra duty for indecent exposure. **The airman violated**

**UCMJ Article 134 -- General Article.**

- A senior airman was demoted in rank to airman first class and received a reprimand for

writing bad checks. The airman violated **UCMJ Article 134-- Dishonorably failing to maintain funds.**

- A captain was ordered to forfeit \$1,500 pay per month for two months (\$1,000 per month for two months suspended) and received a reprimand for destruction of property and being drunk and disorderly. The captain violated **UCMJ Articles 109 -- Destruction of property other than military, 133 -- Conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman, and 134 -- General article.**

Some or all of these members were subsequently administratively discharged.

In each Article 15, the member's commander considered the offense and the punishment based on individual circumstances. The circumstances include the nature of the offense, the record of the service-member, the need for good order and discipline and the effect of non-judicial punishment on the service-member.

Individuals with prior misconduct usually receive more severe punishment than first-time offenders. Therefore, punishment for similar offenses may vary based on factors not listed here.

When punishment is suspended, it does not take effect unless other misconduct occurs, generally within the six months following the Article 15.

# Keep safety in mind while celebrating holiday weekend

The Fourth of July is a time to reflect on the history of our country, our freedoms and our forefathers who made it possible. It's also a time for barbecues with friends, road trips and best of all, fireworks.

The 7th Bomb Wing Safety office offers these safety tips to help ensure the holiday is fun and safe:

**Barbecuing:** If people plan on grilling, here are some tips to remember:

- When ready to barbecue, protect yourself by wearing a heavy apron and an oven mitt that fits over the forearm.

- With gas grills, make sure the gas cylinder is always stored outside and away from the house. Make sure the valves are turned off when not in use.

Check regularly for leaks in the connections using a soap and water mix that will show bubbles where gas escapes.

- Barbecue grills should be kept on a level surface away from the

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house, garage, landscaping and, most of all, children.

- For charcoal grills, only use starter fluids designed for those grills. Never use gasoline and use a limited amount of starter fluid. If the fire is too slow, rekindle with dry kindling and add more charcoal if necessary. Never add more liquid fuel -- it could cause a flash fire.

- Be sure to soak the coals with water before placing them in the trash.

- Remember that grills remain hot long after people are through barbecuing.

**Driving:** When having friends over, have a plan in place to ensure drinkers won't drive.

- Long weekends often give people an opportunity to get out of town and do something different. Remember to plan trips realistical-

ly and safely. Driving round trip from Abilene to California in a few days is not a realistic plan for travelers.

- Plan a route with rest stops of at least 15 minutes and stick to them. Add stops when necessary. If traveling over five hours, have a buddy to share the driving.

**Fireworks:** Fireworks should be handled professionally. If people purchase and light fireworks, these are some things to keep in mind:

- Fireworks must be stored in a cool dry space more than 50 feet from volatile liquids and not in direct sunlight.

- It is illegal to possess or use fireworks within the city limits.

- Fireworks are legal to use in Taylor County with the landowner's permission.

- Shooting fireworks or trans-

porting them in the Abilene city limits is not permitted.

- Shooting fireworks from a county road is illegal.

- Before using fireworks, call the county judge's office at 674-1235 to see if a fire ban is in effect.

- Light on a smooth flat surface away from a house, dry leaves, trees and flammable materials.

- Do not lengthen or shorten the fireworks' fuses.

- Do not relight duds. Wait 15-20 minutes, then soak them in a bucket of water.

- Never carry fireworks in pockets.

- Light only one at a time and keep a safe distance.

- Dispose of fireworks by soaking them and disposing in a trash can.

- Sparklers burn at such high temperatures that they burn clothing.

The major said the 317th AG was well prepared for the LSET visit.

"We began preparing for this inspection more than five months ago with the formation of a quality assurance assessment team," he said. "The QA team took the LSET checklist and inspected each squadron in the group."

Both the 317th MXS and 317th AMXS commanders also formed inspection preparation teams within their units and built a list of "best practices" to show the team, McLeod added.

"(Going into the inspection) we were confident about our high standard of compliance," he said. "Our inspection teams identified 34 areas of non-compliance or compliance with minor write-ups prior to the team's arrival. In fact, we presented this list of discrepancies to the team in their welcome packages so they could see where our self-identified problems were."

By the end of the inspection, the LSET identified 31 compliant with minors and only four non-compliant areas. Of the 35 total write-ups identified by the team, the 317th AG preparation teams identified more than 70 percent prior to the teams' arrival and had management actions under way to address and correct them, McLeod said.

"So, there were virtually no surprises during the inspection, which testifies to our level of preparation," McLeod said.

McLeod added that he and other officials agree that all the 317th AG members earned this rating.

"Undoubtedly, the single greatest factor leading to this rating was the spirit and energy of our workforce," McLeod said. "The inspection team chief commented in his closing remarks that the entire team was impressed with our professionalism, enthusiasm and our commitment to our mission."

"It was the leadership of our squadron commanders and the indomitable spirit of our people which brought this all together."

The 317th AG's next LSET visit will be in December 2005.

# Area Defense Counsel -- Protecting airmen's rights

When Dyess members have legal questions, the Area Defense Counsel may be the answer.

The ADC provides free, confidential legal defense services to military members who are accused of a crime, under investigation or facing adverse administrative actions.

The ADC represents officers and enlisted members in a variety of actions including courts-martial, administrative discharges, demotions, accident investigations, flying evaluation boards, letters of reprimand, reports of survey and promotion propriety actions.

Part of the counsel's activities include promoting justice and strengthening confidence in discipline by providing the best possible legal defense services for military members. Under Air Force rules of professional conduct, the

counsel's primary obligation and loyalty is to the client.

One unique aspect of the ADC is that it is an independent organization. The counsel does not work for the wing commander or the base legal office. They work for a separate chain of command, the Air Force Legal Services Agency, at Bolling Air Force Base, Washington, D.C.

The separate chain of command ensures ADCs are not pressured by any commander against their client's best interest.

The counsel also provides confidential services for its customers. Only chaplains and the ADC possess this privilege. This confidentiality also applies to the defense paralegal.

Dyess' ADC is located in building 7235, next to the Airman Leadership School on Third Street.



In a slow purposeful motion, Bone Ops goalie Billy Edmunds raised his head and looked hard into the eyes of his opponent, 7th Logistics Readiness Squadron's Byung Kang.
