# Former vice commander awarded LOM

The Dyess wing commander recently presented the Legion of Merit to Col. Tom Bell, former 7th Bomb Wing vice commander, during a surprise ceremony at the wing conference room.

Col. Jonathan George, 7th BW commander, presented the award June 20 to Bell, who thought he was going to receive a briefing about an ongoing Air Force Office of Special Investigations case.

"This award is a reflection of the all the hard work all the people on this base accomplish," Bell said. "They were the ones turning the wrenches out there and getting the job done for us, making sure this base stayed running."

George said he was honored to present Bell with the award.

"The LOM is a rare award to attain," George said. "It is generally reserved for com-

manders such as wing commanders and group commanders. Most colonels (in the Air Force) don't get the chance to command at that level, so it is incredibly significant for Colonel Bell to be presented with this award."

The Legion of Merit, established by an Act of Congress in 1942, is awarded to armed forces members and on nationals of other countries who have "disting-

uished themselves by exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service."

The medal, which is awarded for combat and noncombatant services, is the highest award given to military members during peacetime and has four degrees of importance based on the position the recipient holds.

Bell earned the award for his efforts in leading the

wing for nearly half the time he was assigned to Dyess. After arriving in August 2001, Bell took up the reins for Dyess from December 2001 to March 2002 when the 7th BW commander deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. Bell once again answered the call to lead the wing when George, then 7th Air Expeditionary Wing commander, deployed earlier this year to Andersen Air Base, Guam.

During his tenure as the acting wing commander, Bell instituted the first-ever dual dock B-1 phase inspections. Less than a year later, he led the largest bomber deployment since Vietnam and the largest B-1 deployment ever. Even with a depleted staff and focus on combat operations, Bell spearheaded the planning and execution of the B-1 consolidation effort, wing reorganization, and the biggest air show in Dyess'

# Air Force announces end to Stop-Loss

WASHINGTON -- The last of the airmen whose retirement or separation was delayed by Stop-Loss for

Operation Iraqi Freedom were released Monday and will be eligible to leave the service July 31.

Air Force officials authorized Stop-Loss for 43 officer and 56 enlisted specialties in early March to meet

national security objectives, specifically the war in Iraq.

More than half of the specialties were released from the program May 14.

Michael Dominguez, assistant secretary of the

Air Force for manpower and reserve affairs, said the program's success, meaning victory in the war, led directly to its conclusion.

# Don't look at progress through Western eyes

BAGRAM AIR BASE, Afghanistan -- A couple hundred yards outside the perimeter here, loudspeakers blasting Afghan music permeate the night air. Faintly, the sounds of laughter and shouting come from the compound housing the local Afghan militia force there.

For the past three hours I've been stretched out on my cot, tossing and turning and trying to sleep despite the noise. It's now 1 a.m., and my first thought is, "Man, in the States they'd be getting a visit from the police for partying like this."

Then, upon reflection, playing loud music -- any music for that matter -- would have resulted in a lot more than a \$100 fine two years ago in Afghanistan under the Taliban regime. In fact, a ticket would be a blessing in a country that only two years ago was ruled with an iron fist.

Lying there, I considered how my "Western" eyes looked at everything going on in the country right now, especially the progress of coalition forces to bring peace and stability to a region that in many ways came to a stop decades ago.

It's easy to look around and say Afghanistan today is exactly the same as it was 100 or even 500 years ago -- a living, breathing time capsule in the middle of a world of technological and social advances.

Most Afghan cities don't have decent plumbing, electricity or adequate hous-

ing. Most women still walk about town in full abaya and won't speak or look at anyone but their husbands or immediate families and wouldn't even think twice about baring their faces or any part of their body, despite the lifting of that ban by the central government.

Progress doesn't seem to have come to the country, despite the time and effort coalition forces have put into stabilizing the region so far. But that measure of progress is seen through the eyes of a Westerner and doesn't necessarily apply here.

Exactly 100 years ago, the Wright brothers conducted their first airplane flight. It would be another 17 years before the first commercial radio went live, 24 years before the first television and 36 years before the first computer.

More than one-third of the past 100 years in Afghanistan has been spent in constant warfare. When it wasn't civil war, it was the Russian invasion and occupation, or the Taliban rule that drove off or murdered most of the intellectual elite in the country. It's no wonder they are behind the curve when their progress is measured against Western standards of today.

Progress is taking shape in Afghanistan -- incrementally, but it's coming. According to many experts, true progress will take at least a couple of generations.

Outside, the Afghan militia force compound has grown quiet and the music has stopped. It's reassuring to know all the soldiers, airmen, Marines and sailors here have played a part in making sure progress hasn't also stopped.



On championship teams, groups of individuals are able to adjust, adapt, and come together in order to successfully face the challenges in front of them. The past three months have clearly demonstrated that Team Dyess is a championship team.

In late February and early March, many Dyess personnel deployed as the driving force of the 7th Air Expeditionary Wing.

The ability of this championship team to adapt led to great accomplishments in a short period of time.

Just three weeks after stand-up, the 7th AEW launched an amazing 103 bomber sorties in just 66.5 hours using only 13 aircraft. Less than two weeks later, thanks to "round-the-clock efforts" by mission planners, maintainers, weather troops, suppliers, air traffic control, security forces, aviators and many others, all the planes were gone -- successfully evacuated to escape the threat of Typhoon Kujira. And on the heels of Kujira, our dedicated reserve troops and their WC-130s boldly flew storm missions in addition to several search and rescue missions.

The opportunity to take part in a repatriation ceremony was an incredibly moving event. As was the trip to the World War II battle island of Iwo Jima. Many would never have experienced these were it not for our time at Andersen.

Sometimes it is hard to measure success when your mission is establishing deterrence against potential aggression and promoting stability in a vast region, but make no mistake -- the 7th AEW did succeed.

The true measure of that success is that the 7th AEW was never called to fly into combat. The overwhelming firepower, technology and professionalism possessed by the 7th AEW was a tremendously intimidating fact that was certainly in the minds of every potential adversary. Just as America stands by its convictions, commitments and morals, the 7th stood ready to defend people and the ideals that inspire them. And, potential enemies recognize that.

On behalf of all the men and women of the 7th AEW and Team Dyess, I want to pass on my sincerest gratitude to all of you -- deployed or not, military or civilians -- for joining with us in these successes. You have truly demonstrated that Team Dyess is a championship team.

# Dyess Inn prepares for Air Force-level evaluation

Dyess Innkeepers are "leaving the light on" for Air Force evaluators next week, as they judge the base's lodging operations Monday and Tuesday.

The inspection is part of the annual Innkeeper Award competition that identifies the best lodging facility in the Air Force, officials said. After winning at Air Combat Command-level earlier this year, Dyess now competes against nine other bases from across the Air Force for this year's title.

"I'm confident we'll win the Air Force title this year," said Karl Owen, Dyess Inn general manager. "We have the absolute best people working here who are team-motivated and dedicated -- not just during competition time, but all year round. We have the absolute best support from across the base and we have the best customers."

The main objective of the competition is to determine which base has the best hotel/motel environment in the Air Force with the highest customer satisfaction, Owen said. During the evaluation, the Innkeeper team will inspect administrative areas, control processes, customer service skills, attitudes of the employees and wing-level support.

But the most important aspect of the competition is guest service and customer satisfaction, Owen said. Which, he added, the Dyess lodging team makes their top priority every day.

"We continue to look for ways to improve customer satisfaction and make them feel special from the time they walk through the front door to the time they leave," Owen said. "That's why we have such programs as our customer call-back service, where we call each guest 30 minutes after they check into their rooms to make

sure everything meets their standards, and breakfast-to-go program and toy check-out programs."

The lodging team is also in the process of implementing another new program in which they will provide the local newspaper to interested customers.

Lt. Col. Paul Myers, 7th Services Squadron commander, says it is the lodging team's creativity in trying to achieve customer satisfaction through programs like these and their dedica-

tion to their job that should place them with a good chance of winning.

"Our troops, whether military or civilian, are the essence of what the Innkeeper trophy represents -- commitment to excellence, personal daily sacrifices to serve, enduring patriotism and superior customer service," Myers said. "Customer service is always first with them and it shows in the customer comment cards. (Our troops) make our lodging operation the outstanding operation it is."

# Poster contest helps FOD awareness



Each month, taxpayers lose hundreds of thousands of dollars while Dyess airmen lose time fixing and replacing aircraft parts because of foreign object damage.

FOD is any damage to an aircraft engine, aircraft system, equipment or tire caused by an object which could possibly degrade the required safety or operational characteristic of the engine, aircraft system or tire, said Staff Sgt. Jesus Ramirez, quality assurance inspector.

FOD can come in any shape or size. According to Ramirez, each bit of FOD has the potential to be expensive, if not deadly.

"In May alone, preventable FOD was responsible for more than \$252,000 of damage," Ramirez said. "Non-preventable FOD -- like bird incidents -- on the other hand, only caused around \$3,000 damage. We clearly need to enhance FOD awareness."

One way to enhance FOD awareness is the FOD poster program.

Airmen from any unit can submit a FOD awareness poster. With each submission, people have a chance to win prizes, including Burger King coupons, tickets to movies at the base theatre or even a

one-day pass, Ramirez said.

According to Ramirez, a good FOD poster promotes FOD awareness and is only limited by one's imagination. Past FOD posters used a variety of ideas, including a 'FOD collage' and various takes on popular marketing slogans such as

'got FOD?' The most recent winner of the FOD poster contest, Col. William Foote, 7th Mission Support Group commander, used the logo of an international delivery company as his inspiration.

"I keep seeing the FedEx trucks and vans cruising the base and thought a poster that plays off a recognizable national brand would be clever and eye-catching," Foote said. "My goal is to keep the message fresh by keeping it visible."

"(Besides,) I thought a little creativity submitted by a colonel might spur some interest on the part of younger folks," Foote added.

The winners and their posters also win a spot in the *Peacemaker*, as well as on the information board of each squadron, Ramirez said.

"Our goal is to keep everyone aware," Ramirez said. "If we are vigilant, (we can) keep our aircraft flying and free from damage."

The Stop-Loss release applies to all active-duty, Reserve and Air National Guard people in all enlisted grades and officers in the grade of colonel and below; however, deployed airmen must remain in place for the duration of their deployment, he added.

Military personnel flight officials will contact people who had a previously approved/suspended retirement or separation to review their options and establish a new departure date. Released airmen will be allowed up to five months transition time.
