317th returns

Group to spend first holiday season home in years

More than 200 deployed airmen from the 317th Airlift Group were welcomed home to Dyess Sunday.

The airmen, who deployed at various times and locations in support of operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom, were greeted not only by family and friends, but also by base leadership, Abilene Mayor Grady Barr and the Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy Band.

"The purpose of this welcome was to thank the families and (airmen) for their great service," said Col. Richard Johnston, 317th

AG commander. "People would come home and then leave again. We wanted a sense of closure to these recurring deployments."

Despite the rigorous deployment pace, the 317th AG made its mark.

"During nearly 24 months of continuous deployment, we flew almost 20,000 combat and combat support flying hours and approximately 7,000 sorties," said Johnston.

Returning from several remote locations in the Middle East, the 317th completed a hugely successful deployment, Johnston said.

One such success story will be remembered by soldiers of the U.S. Army who were engaged in a firefight

"Being able to provide direct support to the war fighters and contributing to

the liberation of 46 million Iraqi and Afghani people will be something the 317th won't soon forget," Johnston said. "If there are Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine or coalition partners that need our support, we want to be there."

Leadership Today

Leadership is the most important aspect of skills that we try to develop in our people. In reality, it's a tough skill to mature. We spend years developing our leaders, both on the officer and enlisted sides. Chief master sergeants and colonels aren't made over night because the experiences needed to correctly deal with complex issues and problem sets require a foundation that usually only comes with time. Good quality leadership is even better when the "boss" has seen the same challenge before and has worked through the issue to produce winning results. In these previous challenges the "boss" was oftentimes under the mentorship of someone else who had already seen the correct pathway to winning. That's why mentorship is so important to our success -- one challenge successfully met leads to opportunities to face even bigger challenges the next time around.

On the easy side, leaders are supposed to be honest, loyal, smart, trustworthy, hard working, wise, ethical and a dozen more fine attributes. But all of these desirable qualities only guarantee one thing -- a nice person. They don't guarantee great leadership. Great leaders should have all those fine attributes and a whole lot more. Here are three pieces of the "whole lot more."

First, establish the vision. People are inspired to greatness when they recognize the value of a plan that is going to make life better. If the leader can get the troops to visualize a brighter future, most of the troops -- and therefore the team -- will get there.

Second, set clear expectations. Make sure the team knows the steps to make the vision come to life. Make sure that everyone knows when the game is won.

Third, represent the troops. No one is more prepared to represent the team than it's leader. Therefore, if the leader doesn't represent the troops the troops will become despondent and feel neglected. The best way of representing the troops is to work hard at gathering the resources necessary to win. But be careful because there are very few times in life that you'll have everything that you'll need to get the job done right. Determine what the team needs, grab what you can and figure out how to win by making the most of what you've got. This approach quickly leads to improved quality of life.

None of the above is a secret, but leadership is best developed by doing. Get involved in leadership building projects. Don't wait for our great institution to bestow the formal title of leader on you. Volunteer to help out on projects. Look for ways to improve the team. And don't limit yourself to just base activities. Every community has an untold number of things that can be helped or fixed. Great leaders are almost always taught in the best school -- the school of experience.

Remember, experience is the best teacher and that particularly applies to developing leadership. Leadership comes from study and the best studying comes from observing the actions that work for you when you're practicing leadership. Take on a project and watch what is effective in motivating other people. Challenge yourself and teammates to become better. Develop expertise and demonstrate your willingness to tackle the toughest tasks. Focus on the mission. Focus on the people. Do all of these and you'll improve as a leader. The better we are at being leaders, the better we'll be at everything!



This week's surge has been a huge success! The ability to prepare jets and crews, fight the weather, support the direct and indirect processes needed to keep the base going, and execute a demanding around-the-clock combat style mission flow is necessary to winning in combat. The skills to accomplish all the elements that make a surge happen are only developed by a deliberate process that includes study, planning, preparation and finally experience—by practicing—by action. Team Dyess did all of that very, very well! Congratulations on showing how to lead the way!

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Dyess conducts B-1 sortie surge

The 7th Bomb Wing collectively tested its airpower capability as the Dyess bomber force launched a three-day sortie surge Tuesday through Thursday.

The surge involved around-the-clock sortie generation that incorporated the entire operations and maintenance communities, according to Dyess officials.

“A surge is defined as producing 50 percent more of the normal flying for a given period,” said Lt. Col. Pete Holcomb, 13th Bomb Squadron director of operations. “For this surge, we are producing more than 300 percent of the normal flying over a three day period.”

Surges are conducted to simulate actual combat taskings. The capabilities of air crews, maintainers and logistics systems must be determined before they are tested in a combat environment. The surge is designed to stress the entire wing with the number of sorties being produced and flown, Holcomb said.

“We are shooting for 105 of 120 planned sorties as success,” Holcomb said. “We also track several categories such as most on time takeoffs, most sorties for a given aircraft and most weapons drops for a given aircraft and crew.”

The bombers launched to perform bombing missions at four bombing ranges including Melrose Range at Cannon Air Force Base, N.M., and the Smokey Hill Range in Kansas. The types of missions flown were generated from real-world input from operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

“The goal for the surge is to gather lessons learned on how to increase

the number of sorties we provide (a Joint Forces Air Component Commander) in combat,” Holcomb said. “Everyone knows that bombers can fly around the world to deliver combat capability. We are showing the combatant commanders that bombers can deploy to a theater and employ at rates that are approaching those of fighter aircraft.”

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7 MDG to host awareness events

Luncheon held in observance of National Breast Cancer Awareness Month

The 7th Medical Group Women's Health Clinic will sponsor a National Breast Cancer Awareness Month luncheon from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday at The Heritage Club.

The luncheon will feature Dr. Victor Hirsch, an oncologist and cancer survivor, who will speak on the latest breast cancer treatments and his perspective of winning his battle with cancer. Also, Anne Giddens, Abilene American Cancer Society representative, will discuss the latest developments in prevention and community resources for breast cancer treatment.

"I recommend everyone come to the luncheon to hear what Dr. Hirsch and Anne Giddens have to say," said Capt. Linda Hagemann, 7th MDG Women's Health Clinic nurse practitioner. "Our past luncheons have focused on cancer research and prevention. This year's luncheon will unfold the newest treatments available not only to women, but men who are diagnosed with breast cancer."

Despite continued technological advances, there is no cure for breast cancer. For this reason, the American Cancer Society continues to pursue its prevention campaign by emphasizing early detection.

The American Cancer Society attributes 15 percent of cancer deaths in women to breast cancer. By the age of 85, a woman's risk of getting breast cancer has increased to one in eight.

With early detection, women can experience a five-year survival rate of 96 percent, according to the National Breast Cancer Foundation.

The American Cancer Society recommends all women protect themselves by learning and continuing monthly self-exams, getting a yearly clinical breast exam by a health care provider and scheduling routine mammograms beginning at age 40.

"Examinations should be done systematically to detect abnormal lumps, unusual swelling, dimpling, thickening, or discharge," Hagemann said. "This simple procedure is inexpensive, but can be very valuable in saving lives."

Additionally, women should have other tests done to monitor their health annually. The Women's Health Clinic will offer appointments on Oct. 29 and 30 for women with overdue annual exams. To schedule an appointment for an annual exam, call the 7th MDG appointment line at 696-4677.

"We hope this event will help in continuing to raise awareness of breast cancer and the importance of prevention through early detection," Hagemann said.

For more information or to reserve a seat for the luncheon, contact the Women's Health Clinic at 696-5432. The luncheon cost is \$6.90 club members and \$8.90 for non-members. Today is the deadline to reserve seats. All proceeds will be used in conjunction with the Combined Federal Campaign to support breast cancer research.

Phase I/II begins

Exercise tests ability to deploy, fight

Dyess begins a Phase I/II exercise Wednesday.

The exercise is the next of four the base has been performing to prepare for the upcoming Operational Readiness Inspection in January.

The exercise will test the wing's ability to mobilize and deploy to a forward operating location and begin flying sorties. This exercise scenario will simulate the wing deploying to a bare-base at an undisclosed location.

During Phase II, "Base X," where the members have simulated deploying to, will be considered a notional base and does not represent any specific location. As a result, Base X is subject to a wide array of exercise inputs.

Base officials remind players that the new Counter Chemical Warfare Concept of Operations will be utilized during the upcoming exercise.

Participants in the exercise are also reminded:

- As per Air Combat Command's inspector general's office, cell phone use is prohibited during the Phase II.

- Individuals identified as not having a gas mask or over boots must carry a simulation letter provided by their unit.

- For marking ground crew ensembles, use two-inch wide green duct tape or masking tape to place service component (USAF), rank, and first and last name on identification markings. The identification markings will be placed on the front and back of the helmet and protective mask hood and above the right breast pocket of the GCE. Two-inch wide masking tape marked "M-9" will simulate M-9 chemical detector paper and will be attached to the jacket and pants placed at both ankles, both wrists, and both biceps.

- Host nation personnel are required to place an approximate two-inch wide square of green duct tape or masking tape marked with a large letter "H" on the right breast pocket of the GCE.

- Protective masks will be inspected no later than the transition day and every seven days thereafter in accordance with orders for wartime and the DD Form 1574 will be properly annotated.

- All privately owned vehicles must be out of the play area (Base "X") by 10 p.m. Wednesday. All required night shift participants must drive their vehicles to Bldg. 7008 and process through the toxic free area and be in place at their workstation by 11 p.m. Wednesday. 7 BW/IG inputs can begin after midnight Thursday.

- Unexploded ordnance sweep teams discovering a UXO must maintain a distance of 50 feet and mark its location. Do not transmit with a hand-held radio within 82 feet or 100 feet with a vehicle-mounted radio of a UXO. UXO sweep teams must carry UXO marking and self-aid/buddy care kits.


- Alarm Green will be used as the normal wartime condition (resume operations or continue recovery actions). Alarm Yellow will be used when attack is probable in less than 30 minutes (protect and cover assets, go to protective shelter or seek best protection with overhead cover).

- Alarm Red is divided into two categories: Alarm Red Air and Alarm Red Ground. For Alarm Red Air, aerial attack is imminent or in progress. Seek overhead cover protection and report observed attacks. For Alarm Red Ground, attack by ground forces is imminent or in progress. Take immediate cover, defend self and position, and report activity.

- Alarm Black will be used when attack is over and NBC

contamination and/or UXO hazards are suspected or present. For Alarm Black, perform self-aid/buddy care and remain under overhead cover or within shelter until directed otherwise.

- Procedures for the alarm conditions and other useful information are outlined in the Dyess local ATSO guide. The guide is available online at wwwmil.dyess.af.mil/7ces/flight/cex/dyessatso.htm.

Paper copies of the locally developed ATSO guide will be provided to all players at the TFA before the start of the Phase II. For more information about the exercise, people can contact the 7th BW plans and programs office at 6-1606.

C-CW CONOPS

Due to exercise hostilities, Base "X" will implement the Counter Chemical Warfare Concept of Operations (C-CW CONOPS), to include division of the base into Chemical Zones (Sectors) and Ground Defense Sectors and implementation of Transition Points (TPs).

TPs are established between Chemical Zones to control entrance to and exit from potentially contaminated areas and are the only authorized points by which a

person may transit the sectors.

At a TP, people can expect to see a sign indicating the sector they are entering as well as the current Mission Oriented Protection Posture level and the time of the last data update. TPs will be manned when possible.

It is vital for all personnel that only the Transition Points be used to cross between Chemical Zones (Sectors). See the 7 CES Readiness locally developed ATSO guide for additional C-CW CONOPS guidance.

Field food services

The mobile kitchen trailer in the cantonment area will provide these meals at the following times:

- **Dinner** -- Meals Ready to Eat will be handed out from 5:30 to 7 p.m. Cost is \$3.25.

- **Midnight** -- Hot meals will be served from 10:30 p.m. to midnight. Cost is \$3.25.

The Longhorn Dining Facility will also be open during its regular hours of operation.

The TFA during exercise

All Phase II exercise players will enter and exit "Base X" through the toxic free area facility located in Bldg. 7008 at 426 3rd Street. No POVs are deployed to "Base X". Dropping off of players and parking of POVs will be in the large parking lot to the west of Bldg. 7008.

Deployed and host nation personnel must process through the TFA facility at the beginning and at the end of their shift. Personnel reporting for duty will enter at the west of Bldg. 7008. All participants must bring the following items when processing through the TFA:

- Military identification (ID) card
- Dog tags
- Ability to Survive and Operate (ATSO) Guide (Dyess)
- Reflective belt
- Gas Mask
- C-1 bag, with chemical ground crew ensemble
- A-1 items, helmet, canteen full of water, and web belt
- Line badge (if required)
- Simulated M8 paper booklet

Phase II players will need the items listed above, but the TFA will only check ID cards and dog tags. Unit deployment managers will check you have the remaining items before the Phase II starts to help streamline the process. Manning rosters will be used to check that player's process in and out of the play area.

After processing into the TFA, personnel will exit the building from the north side and board a shuttle bus that will take them into the play area (except for those troops authorized GOVs).

At the end of a shift, personnel will board a shuttle bus from their duty sections back to the TFA facility and enter through the north side of the building. Personnel must out-process before leaving the TFA.

Shuttle bus service

The 7th Logistics Readiness Squadron will provide shuttle bus service during the Phase II exercise. Shuttle buses will begin running at 1800 on Wednesday and continue running until two hours after ENDEX. There will be a red, blue, and green route beginning and returning to the TFA facility, located at Bldg. 7008 on Third Street.

The shuttle bus routes will run as follows:

- The **red shuttle** will have a 29-passenger bus starting at Bldg. 7008. This route will take approximately 15 minutes to run round trip.

This shuttle has stops for the WOC at Bldg. 4120; the control tower between Bldg. 4301 and 4302; the Fire station at Bldg. 4003; POL & Security Forces at Alert Ave; and the AWOC at Bldg. 6222.

- The **green shuttle** will only run during cantonment area shift changes. Coordinate with the TCC for run times. This shuttle will have a 29-passenger bus starting at Bldg. 7008. This route will take approximately 20 minutes to run round trip.

The shuttle's only stop is at the entry control point (ECP) to the cantonment area.

- The **blue shuttle** will be used for the main play area. It will have one 44-passenger bus and two 29-passenger buses starting at Bldg. 7008. This route will take approximately 20 minutes to run round trip.

It has stops for all maintenance at Bldg. 5020; the vault at Bldg. 8031; supply at Bldg. 5280; and LRS at Bldg. 8016.

A munitions storage area stop will have prearranged shift change runs with a 44-passenger bus starting at Bldg. 7008. The route will take approximately 25 minutes to run round trip.
